## FROM THE CHIEF - PREVENT CHIMNEY FIRES

Chimney fires are caused when creosote deposits in the flue get too hot and ignite. Creosote is formed when smoke in the exhaust gases condenses on the walls of the flue. The heaviest build-up will be at the top of the flue where the exhaust is coolest. A single fire in your fireplace or wood stove will not deposit enough creosote to create a hazardous build-up, but a season of burning green wood may. Even if you only burn very dry wood a small amount of creosote is deposited each time a fire is started and again when it goes out. This will eventually result in a hazardous level of creosote.

If a chimney fire starts, the rapid rise in temperature in the flue can crack tile or masonry flues and may warp metal flues. When the flue is damaged, hot gases can escape into your house and start a structure fire. Even if the fire stays in the chimney, the fire can eject sparks or embers onto your roof or into the surrounding vegetation.

There are commercial products that are supposed to reduce creosote buildup in chimneys, and there are products that are supposed to extinguish chimney fires after they have been detected. Read their literature and decide if you want to use the product. Also, once a chimney fire is detected, call 911.

The best way to prevent chimney fires is to use only seasoned wood and have your chimney cleaned annually. For additional information, you can do research online. The following link has good information; (<https://www.csa.org/chimneyfires.html>).

### IMPACT OF GALLAGHER AMENDMENT

Every two years the Poudre Canyon Fire Protection District has experienced a decrease in potential revenues since the Gallagher amendment passed in 1982. Thankfully, due to increases in property values, we have not felt the decreases, yet. Why are rural communities negatively impacted? It is because there are fewer commercial properties to contribute to the tax base.

The board is wrestling with how to make up this difference in revenue. Many departments in the last election asked their residents to de-Gallagher. All of these measures passed, probably because there is no change in the tax you are currently paying for emergency service. Poudre Canyon is looking into this option.
